Dear Sir, please state your name, title and what you do.

My name is Andre L. Wright Sr., I am the education director at Jackson St. Boys & Girls Club.

How would you label the state of our people?

Everybody caught on to this thing, of, translucence into entrepreneurship. Really, its been there to catch on fire it's just those who open their eyes to see it. Can't really put a title on it, because its like the leap year, it comes and goes - give every 5 years it might be around - then you sleep on it every 5 years. That's the way it basically is, you gotta catch it.

What was your reasoning behind enlisting in the military?

I proceeded in the military because I didn't have any more money, all my grants & scholarships ran out in college. So I went in the military to basically finish my education & to travel. I started off as Airborne | Air Assault then I went ranger school. You know I really enjoyed jumping out of planes & it was just playful, it was fun & games but then by then it was already 10 years so I might as well stick it out for the long haul. So all we was seasoned veterans, in the field that I labeled in. I was a grunt, 13 seconds expectancy on life on the battlefield the time I exited the plane. But, then I was able to go change my M.O.S. to orthopedic's. But, basically with



that grunt M.O.S., you can work in a hospital but when a conflict or anything comes out being with the ready deployment group and plus stationed with the rangers we always had a two-hour time base to proceed and go on. My family went with me, you know, everywhere I went we went - to see other countries and get festive with the people of that country. It was great, I advise everybody - if you could travel, travel. It's a beautiful thing.

How did you sustain, with a family?

Communication & love. You know, you take on this base of a female, that's the foundation & then you want the foundation to grow & that's with children and knowledge plus you proceed to get knowledge between one another. You will never be able to take a step forward without that next step & you become one you're equal.

In terms of politics, what would you say makes a 'lawmaker' outspoken?


Lifestyle, meaning your upbringing. What was instilled in you as a kid, because remember - when you walk outside that door, your last name, you're representing your ancestors. Your grandmother, your grandfather, his father, his mother on down the line. What made you get involved with the boys & girls club?

I proceeded once I left there, I was there for a year & four months. & then in that transition I proceeded to put myself on levy to go overseas to get away from it & during that time when I did put myself on levy to go I ended up, falling right back into the same outfit, but going with the U.N. being one of the first groups to go into Bosnia, you know, Croatia & everything. After that conflict ceased it took a lot out on me, you know, I didn't know at

the time I had post-traumatic stress I didn't realize I had rage. So there was a little bitterness a lot of anguish towards the government because they kept acknowledging that there was nothing over there we didn't experience nothing - post-traumatic stress was unbelievable. We had rage, I had rage, I still have night sweats, but, the kids. Seeing the youth, for one thing when I got back it was culture shock. To see the kids walk around with their pants below their waste, I mean below their buttocks what is this? We always been symbolized as kings squeens, considered you know, wisdom squeens, you know, shakers squeens, you know, not proceeding 20 steps back. I don't understand this, but the kids did. Not knowing how many days in a year, not knowing what is the shortest month of the 12 months, not knowing basically their blood type, not knowing basic things respect squeens responsibility. So I felt as though this is my time from killing to healing. So this is what I did with it and I been



their ever since.
